WHAT MUST I DO TO BE SAVED?

Acts 16:30-32 And brought them out, and said, Sirs, what must I do to be saved? 31 And they said, Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ, and thou shalt be saved, and thy house. 32 And they spake unto him the word of the Lord, and to all that were in his house.

he question of salvation is one that many non-Christians have pondered. God's prevenient grace has left them disillusioned with sin and anxious to be at peace with God; but like the Philippian jailor, they do not know how to be saved. They need someone to share the Word of the Lord with them. If you are a searching non-Christian, or a Christian who simply wants to share the Gospel with an unbeliever, consider two principles that compose the foundation of God's redemptive work. Without them a seeker of salvation is certain to be disappointed.

One must believe in the Christian God

This step may seem simplistic, but it is critical in receiving salvation. Since there are no gods beside the Christian God, (See Exodus 20:3, Isaiah 42:8, 45:5) it only stands to reason that one must acknowledge the living God's person and authority. To refuse to acknowledge God's person or to distort His identity in any way is to deceive ourselves and become guilty of idolatry—a profoundly serious sin in God's sight. (Exodus 34:14, Deuteronomy 32:16, Hebrews 11:6)

One must believe that Jesus Christ is the only provision for salvation

One often hears the claim that it does not matter what a person's spiritual beliefs are if they sincerely believe in something. God will honor that belief and receive them into heaven; but such teaching is heretical. Jesus said in John 14:6 "I am the way, the truth and the life. No man cometh to the Father but by me," and Paul instructed this jailor in verse 31 to "believe," not in a local pagan deity but "in the Lord Jesus Christ." (See also Acts 4:12, John 5:23, 6:67-69) The fact that God the Father sent Christ the Son as the atoning sacrifice for sin (1 John 4:14, 2 Corinth 5:18-21) should be enough to silence complaint over the narrowness of the way and inspire gratitude that a way has been provided.

Biblical Steps to Salvation

How then can a person be saved? Is generic belief in Jesus alone enough to redeem us? Notice the word of the Lord regarding salvation. The following principles are no doubt what Paul and Silas shared with the pagan jailor in verse 32, for this is what Paul taught his churches on the subject.

1.) Agree with God that you are a Sinner:

We see this sinful jailor agreeing with God in verses 29-30. He does not try to defend his spiritual integrity or display a self-righteous spirit.





THE GIFT OF PREVENIENT GRACE

revenient grace, or "preventing grace" as John Wesley called it, is the grace that "goes before." It is that grace which precedes human action and reflects God's heart for his creation. It testifies to God's being the initiator of any relationship with him and reveals him as one who pursues us. (John 6:44, 65)

Prevenient grace is available to all, such that there is no "natural man" left in a purely fallen state without a measure of God's restorative grace. Furthermore, prevenient grace is salvific in direction. This means the Spirit of God works not just to restore certain faculties of humanity or to limit human sin, but ultimately directs people to the work of Christ. (Jn 16:7-8, 15:26)

The good news is that God acted in Christ and works through his Spirit in bringing us salvation. Wesley's theology of prevenient grace teaches us that God is at work long before the church evangelizes, quickening people's hearts to become the people He intends. ¹

The hymn writer John Newton marveled at this act of God in his famous hymn Amazing Grace: "T'was grace that taught my heart to fear and grace my fears relieved. How precious did that grace appear, the hour I first believed."

Francis Thompson also spoke of this grace in his famous poem The Hound of Heaven.

I fled Him down the nights and down the days
I fled Him down the arches of the years
I fled Him down the labyrinthine ways
Of my own mind, and in the midst of tears
I hid from him, and under running laughter.
Up vistaed hopes I sped and shot precipitated
Adown titanic glooms of chasmed fears
From those strong feet that followed, followed after
But with unhurrying chase and unperturbed pace,
Deliberate speed, majestic instancy,
They beat, and a Voice beat,
More instant than the feet:
All things betray thee who betrayest me.

THE BENEFITS OF GRACE



*The word "unsaved" in this article refers to the non-Christian. The words "sinners", "the wicked," "unbelievers," and "workers of iniquity" are also used in the bible to describe those who have not embraced salvation through Jesus Christ.



Many young people who grow up in holiness homes struggle to find an assurance of salvation. Because they see few outward changes, they may ask, "How do I know that I am born again?" Charles Wesley knew this struggle well. He had grown up in a pastor's home, founded the Holy Club at Oxford, and served as a missionary. As he would later write:

A form of godliness was mine—The power I never knew.

A TESTIMONY OF ASSURANCE

On Pentecost Sunday 1738, Charles testified, "I found peace with God." Two days later, he wrote his first hymn, a hymn that celebrates the joy of a "know-so salvation."

And can it be that I should gain An interest in the Savior's blood? Died He for me, who caused His pain? For me, who Him to death pursued? Amazing love! how can it be That Thou, my God, should die for me?

Assurance is the "for me" of the gospel. It is more than an intellectual knowledge of the doctrine of the new birth. It is a personal appropriation of what God has done. It means that I have gained an interest in the Savior's blood. Wesley testified of his release from years of struggle:

Long my imprisoned spirit lay
Fast bound in sin and nature's night;
Thine eye diffused a quick'ning ray,
I woke, the dungeon flamed with light;
My chains fell off, my heart was free;
I rose, went forth and followed Thee.

Again, notice the pronouns. This was no third person theology: "Their chains fell off...." This was first person experiential theology: "My chains fell off; my heart was free; I rose..."

Paul rejoiced, "There is therefore now no condemnation to them which are in Christ Jesus, who walk not after the flesh, but after the Spirit" (Rom 8:1). In the same way, Wesley sang:

No condemnation now I dread;
Jesus, and all in Him is mine!
Alive in Him, my living Head,
And clothed in righteousness divine,
Bold I approach th'eternal throne,
And claim the crown, through Christ my own.

Because we have been made alive in Christ, we can approach the eternal throne with confidence.

"WHY DO I LACK ASSURANCE?"

"And Can It Be" is a great hymn, but is it reality? Is this testimony possible for the rest of us? There are people in holiness churches who have prayed at the altar and who live careful lives, but who would admit, "I still struggle with ongoing doubts." It seems to me that many sincere believers have false ideas that rob them of the joy of assurance.

We will lack assurance if we have a deficient view of God

I fear that too many Christians have a respect for God's holiness, but little understanding of His love. They cannot conceive the infinite goodness of a God who saves them apart from anything they have earned. They have a deficient view of God.

Charles Wesley's journal on the day he testified to the assurance of faith shows that his confidence was not in himself, but in God. "I went to bed still sensible of my own weakness, yet confident of Christ's protection." Biblical assurance is based on confidence in God, not in self-confidence.

We will lack assurance if we have a deficient view of the gospel

In their fear of eternal security, some Wesleyans have adopted a doctrine of eternal insecurity that is far from Paul's confident testimony: For I am persuaded, that neither death, nor life, nor angels, nor principalities, nor powers, nor things present, nor things to come, Nor height, nor depth, nor any other creature,

shall be able to separate us from the love of God, which is in Christ Jesus our Lord (Rom 8:38-39).

Do you realize the joy of this promise? We do not have to check our spiritual temperature every morning. As we walk in simple trust, nothing can separate us from the love of God. This is genuinely good news!

Another Wesley hymn rejoices: My God is reconciled; His pardoning voice I hear; He owns me for His child; I can no longer fear. With confidence I now draw nigh, And "Father, Abba, Father," cry.

This is the gospel! Not an up-and-down experience of uncertainty and fear but a confident assurance that says, "I have been reconciled to God. He is my Abba."

• We will lack assurance if we have a deficient view of Christian experience

We will struggle if we do not understand temptation. Some preaching has implied that the entirely sanctified person no longer feels tempted. "When you die to sin, you are dead. A dead person can't smell a steak even if you wave it in front of him."

Paul reminded us that temptation is real to every Christian. "Wherefore let him that thinketh he standeth take heed lest he fall" (1 Cor 10:12). But he also reminded us that through God's grace, we can have consistent victory over temptation. "But God is faithful, who will not suffer you to be tempted above that ye are able; but will with the temptation also make a way to escape, that ye may be able to bear it (1 Cor 10:13). Do not let temptation cause you to doubt your salvation. Temptation is not sin.

We will struggle if we do not understand human frailty. Assurance of salvation does not eliminate all struggles.

With his melancholic temperament, Charles Wesley was susceptible to moments of doubt. A few weeks after his great "And Can It Be," Wesley went through a time of emotional struggle in which he wrote, "I could not feel that God loved me." But the assurance of faith gave him confidence to continue, "But I believe he loved me notwithstanding." Wesley was learning to trust God in times of struggle. He was learning to rest not in his own power, but in God's grace.

Emotional struggles, illness, or even spiritual attack may cause moments of doubt. But when our heart condemns us, we can trust God who is "greater than our heart." (1 John 3:20) One of the old Puritans wrote, "The person who has assurance listens to the Spirit who bears witness that he is a child of God. The person who lacks assurance listens to Satan who says that he is not a child of God. So, Christian, why are you listening to Satan?" When we lack feelings, we can listen to the promises of God's Word.

The promise of assurance is one of the great truths of the Wesley revival. Let us never abandon the message that all people can know they are saved! ~RM

THE TRAIN OF FAITH

Taken from Josh McDowell's Evidence That Demands a Verdict: Historical Evidence for the Christian Faith.



The promise of God's Word, not our feelings, is our authority. The Christian lives by faith (trust) in the trustworthiness of God Himself and His Word. This train diagram illustrates the relationship between **fact** (God and His Word), **faith** (our trust in God and His Word), and **feeling** (the result of our faith and obedience) (John 14:21)

The train engine will run with or without the caboose. However, it would be futile to pull the train by the caboose. In the same way, we, as Christians, do not depend on feelings or emotions, but place our faith (trust) in the trustworthiness of God and His Word.

A Definition of Saving Faith

A. Faith is a BELIEF in the eternal, unchanging Word of God. Hebrews 4:2, 6, 11:6

B. Faith is a COMMITTMENT to what God requires, John 14:21, 23-24

C. Faith is a TRUST in what God promises. Galatians 3:14, Romans 1:17, Hebrews 10:38

Faith is acting like God is telling the truth.

10 Words for Aspects of Salvation

Under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, the New Testament writers used a variety of terms to describe the many things that simultaneously occur at the moment of our salvation. Each of these terms helps us to understand the significance and breadth of God's saving work. Here we explore a few of those key terms.



A **PROPITIATION** is something that is given to turn away someone's anger. In salvation, Jesus' sacrifice turns away the righteous anger of God that was against us.¹

Explation, justification, and adoption are all judicial terms that show us what happens in God's legal system when we are saved. **EXPIATION** means that a record has been cleared. In salvation, our record of sins is erased. In **JUSTIFICATION** someone is declared righteous, or innocent. At the moment of salvation, a guilty sinner is counted righteous because Jesus suffered in his place. We are all familiar with **ADOPTION**. When an adoption occurs, someone becomes the legal child of another. In salvation we become the children of God. 1

RECONCILIATION is another relational term. It means that individuals who were enemies have now made peace with each other again. God has done everything required for us to make peace with Him. In salvation, we make peace with God on His terms.¹

REDEMPTION means that a price was paid so that someone can be free. In salvation, Jesus' death is the price that was paid. Now we are free from the bondage and penalty of sin.¹ **DELIVERANCE** is a powerful word that tells us someone is rescued from another's power. In salvation, we are freed from the tyranny and power of Satan and sin.¹ Because we are redeemed and delivered at the time of salvation we now belong to God and are able to serve Him as we were created to do.

God creates new life in us at the time of salvation, called a **NEW BIRTH¹** or **REGENERATION**.¹ In salvation the believer begins a new life, walking with God in a relationship of love and obedience.

SANCTIFICATION is a word that means someone is made holy. In salvation, a sinner is changed into a holy child of God.¹ Because He has given us new life and made us holy, we are able to live for Him.

Paul writes that we are sealed by the Holy Spirit. **SEALING** means that something is marked to show who owns it. In salvation, the Holy Spirit in us identifies each of us as someone who belongs to God.¹

Praise God for His powerful and comprehensive work in salvation!

Subject: Paul's entire life changed in an instant!

Scripture: Acts 9:1-22

I.) His LOYALTY Changed:

A.) The old Saul was loyal to the Jewish law and sent to arrest anyone who proclaimed the name of Christ.

B.) The new Saul resigns himself to calling Jesus, LORD. Submitting himself to Christ and recognizing his authority.

II.) His DESIRE Changed:

A.) His former desire was to see the cause of Christ stamped out and to annihilate anyone associated with Christ.

B.) After submitting to Christ, he asks, "What wilt thou have me to do?" This displays that his desire is now to advance the cause of Christ.

III.) His ACTIONS Changed:

A.) Our actions are based solely on the desires of our heart. If our desires are anti-Christ, our actions will be anti-Christ.

B.) When we submit to Christ, it is inevitable that our actions will change too. Paul later expressed this when he said, Ephesians 4:22 "That ye put off concerning the former conversation the old man, which is corrupt according to the deceitful lusts;" and 2 Corinthians 5:17 Therefore if any man be in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new."

IV.) His SUPPORT Base Changed:

A.) We cannot expect to be in the same mindset as those who deny Christ. The world hates Christ and will hate us too when we identify with Him. B.) There is no greater support than that of the family of God. Not just with fellow believers, but also when Jesus inspired the writer of Hebrews, Hebrews 13:5 Let your conversation be without covetousness; and be content with such things as ye have: for he hath said, I will never leave thee, nor forsake thee.

Application: We can experience, as Paul did, an instantaneous about face, a complete change in our lives.

A Know-So Salvation By Dr. Randall McElwain

Subject: How can I know that I am God's child?

Scripture: 1 John 1-5



One of the apostle's goals in 1 John is to give assurance to the believer. He wants us to be able to testify with confidence, "I know that I am a child of God." Biblical assurance is based on three elements: God's promises in Scripture, the inner witness of the Holy Spirit, and the visible fruit of an obedient life. This assurance is the privilege of every believer.

Biblical assurance is based on the PROMISE of Scripture:

John promised, "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (I John 1:9). Assurance of salvation begins with the confidence that God will keep His promises.

Paul reminds us that we are saved by grace through faith: For by grace are ye saved through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast (Eph 2:8-9). If our assurance is based on our efforts, we will always struggle. Instead, true assurance is based on what God has done. He has already provided everything for our salvation; we can trust His promises.

Oh, how many times I prayed, "God, I think I have enough faith now. I'm trying really hard to believe." And, oh the joy when I finally learned that assurance is based not on the strength of my faith but on what God has done for me.

It is better to have a weak faith in a strong God than a strong faith in a weak God. Assurance is based not on our great faith but on the promises of a great God who says, "Put your feeble faith in me and that is enough."

Yes, to claim these promises, we must meet God's conditions for salvation: repentance for our sins and faith in the finished work of Jesus Christ. But if we have met His conditions, we can have confidence in the promises of a loving Father who "is not willing that any should perish."

2) Biblical assurance is based on the inner WITNESS of the Spirit:

"Hereby know we that we dwell in him, and he in us, because he hath given us of his Spirit" (1 John 4:13). The witness of the Spirit is the consciousness given by God that He has brought us to new life. "The Spirit itself beareth witness with our spirit, that we are the children of God" (Rom 8:16). This may not involve great emotion, but it is an assurance that I am at peace with God.

3) Continuing assurance is based on the FRUIT of an obedient life:

As we live in obedience to God's Word, we see changes in our lives that show we have been made new creatures. This is the testimony of our own spirit that we are living in obedience to His commands.

In 1 John, the apostle lists markers that show that we are children of God. These markers prevent us from deceiving ourselves into confusing an emotional response with the witness of the Spirit. For some of us who grew up in camp meetings, this is particularly important. A powerful evangelist could bring us to the altar, and after some tears, we left feeling better. But too often, we settled for a temporary emotional relief. A week later, we had returned to our old way of life. John summarizes the ongoing fruit that shows we are children of God.

- A child of God obeys God (1 John 2:3-5)
- A child of God does not love the world (1 John 2:15-16)
- -A child of God does not walk in sin (1 John 3:8-10)
- A child of God loves other Christians (1 John 3:14-18)

This is biblical assurance: grounded in the promises of God's Word, witnessed by the Holy Spirit, and confirmed by the fruit of an obedient life.

"Lay not up for yourselves treasures upon earth, where moth and rust doth corrupt, and where thieves break through and steal. But lay up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where neither moth nor rust doth corrupt, and where thieves do not break through nor steal." Matthew 6:19,20

What do we have to gain? Why dedicate our lives to the kingdom of God and give up all the pleasures and thrills of life? I must be honest. There are plenty of pleasures and thrills out there. A couple years ago, I was privileged to get behind the wheel of a Dodge Challenger Scat Pack 392 Hemi with almost 500 HP. I had all that power at my fingertips and miles of empty backroads in front of me. It was a thrill; however, when the time came to hand the keys back to the owner, what did I have to take with me? The memory of a good time. That is all. My point is this:

The pleasures of this world - good or bad - do not bring reward later in life, nor in eternity. Scripture tells us that any treasure of this world will fade away. We cannot live for the moment.

Instead, I challenge you to do two things. First, take a close look at those who have chosen to live for pleasure or for things of this world in general; either it will take you to popularity and wealth that is coupled with loneliness and unsatisfaction or it will take you down the path of destruction that is full of heartache and hardship. Do not look at what appears to be a good time. Remember, sin will take you farther than you ever wanted or expected to go; and most importantly, it will cause you to miss heaven.

Second, take a close look at those who have dedicated their lives to the Kingdom of Heaven. What do you see? I see joy, honor, contentment, and fulfillment. I see a legacy left behind and a difference for eternity.

So, you must decide what you want. Do you want to do something important and lasting? Do you want to be fulfilled? If you do, then give your heart to Jesus. Let Him cleanse your heart from anything not pleasing to Him set you apart for His purpose. Let Him use you for the specific task He has for you. That task will bring true pleasure and fulfillment and will store up heavenly treasures that do not fade away. Choose and resolve to be different. It will be worth it all when we get to heaven because the reward of heaven is better than anything in this messed up world. Store up for yourselves treasures in heaven. If you do that, you will enjoy the journey with Jesus.

He realizes his depravity and humbles himself before God and man. What must I do to be saved? We too must humble ourselves. No matter how good we may be, we still fall short of God's standard of righteousness. The sin nature in our hearts leads us to commit acts of pride, selfishness, hatred, lust, wrath, adultery, and murder and God's law condemns us to physical and spiritual death. (Romans 3:23, Isaiah 64:6, 1 John 1:10, Romans 6:23) If we cannot own up to our sinfulness, our self-righteous attitude will continue to separate us from God and the joy of salvation. (Rom 10:3-4, Php 3:8-9)

2.) Confess and Repent of your Sin:

Biblical repentance is changing your mind about Jesus Christ and turning to God in faith for salvation (Acts 3:19). Turning from sin is one of the results of genuine, faith-based repentance. While we are not privy to this jailor's confessional prayer, he did evidence this change of mind and behavior. Verses 31-34 specifies that he believed, was baptized, washed Paul and Silas stripes, brought them into his house, and fed them. This is a far cry from verse 24 and the man who "thrust them into the inner prison and made their feet fast in the stocks."

A popular misconception of salvation is that we can change our mind about God, and even confess our sins without abandoning them, but this is another false conclusion. If we are sorry for our sins with godly sorrow, we not only feel regret for them, but we will also demonstrate a change for the better. A changed life, (including restitution) is the evidence of true conversion. (Lk 13:3,5, Acts 2:38, Prov 28:13, 2 Cor 7:9-10, Lk 19:8-9) The man who said that he is not saved because he confessed and repented of his sin, but because he put his faith in Christ, has a poor understanding of Christian theology. Confession and repentance of sin is inextricably connected with saving faith.

3.) Believe and Confess the Lord Jesus Christ:

When we acknowledge the Lord Jesus Christ as the only sacrifice for sin and evidence that belief through confession of sin and repentance, we have grounds to believe God for salvation. Our faith can take hold of God's promise and we can trust Him that the work is done. The moment that we believe we are pardoned, justified, regenerated, and adopted into His family. We can rejoice in our new position with God and share with others what God has done for us. We see this illustrated in verse 34 when the jailor "brought them into his house, he set meat before them, and rejoiced, believing in God with all his house." (See also Rom 10:9-10)

A Free Gift

We must keep in mind that salvation cannot be purchased with money or merited by family name or good works. God's salvation is "by grace through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God: Not of works, lest any man should boast. (Ephesians 2:8-9) God requires us to submit to the above steps and simply believe that the gift is ours. (Romans 4:3) When we sincerely obey Him the benefits of salvation appear in our life.

- Our life is transformed. (2 Cor 5:17)
- We have joy and peace with God. (Rom 5:1)
- We enjoy a relationship with God. (John 14:23)
- We have freedom from the practice of sin. (Rom 6:18-22)
- We have new purpose and meaning in life. (John 10:10)
- We have eternal life in our possession. (John 3:16)
- We have a hope that is alive: (1 Peter 1:3)
- We have confidence in the day of judgement. (1 Jn 4:17; 1 Jn 2:28)

Receiving salvation is the most significant thing that can ever happen to you. If you have not yet experienced it, I encourage you to seek God today. He wants to save you now and give you all that He has prepared for His children. ~TRF
