From the President's Desk

A New Start For 2024 Scripture: Philippians 3:13-15 (KJV)

13 Brethren, I count not myself to have apprehended: but *this* one thing *I do*, forgetting those things which are behind, and reaching forth unto those things which are before, 14 I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus.

The Apostle Paul here purposes that whatever gifts, graces or honors he has received from the Lord, he will look upon as incomplete until he has finished his course and received the crown, upon gaining his new body raised and fashioned after the Lord's glorious body. His sole purpose then

is to focus on the prize that God has set before him. He will not allow anything from the past to dim his view of what lies ahead. He has no time to waste. Eternity is coming as quickly as time passes, and one knows not the time when he will step from time into eternity. Reaching forth, he casts aside the opinions of others and embraces God's calling on his life with every muscle tensed with strength for running the race set before him. He presses toward the mark—that white line that marked the ground at the stadium, from the starting place to the goal. The goal was the prize of the high calling of God. We face the same thing today as the Apostle Paul did. There are forces at work in our world to keep us from what God intends for us. The media, public figures, deteriorating societal and cultural norms, evil peer pressure, all products of a fallen world and a decadent society, contribute to an aggregate of bad influence upon us.

We must, like Paul, forget about past failures, and focus like a laser on the challenge of walking carefully and consistently before God, knowing that He will lead us faithfully to Heaven and make our lives fulfilling, an example to and influence upon others around us.

How can we put this together or work it out in our daily lives?

Paralyzed by the Past

I want you to consider three things that the Apostle suggests we should do: first, we must refuse to be **Paralyzed by the Past**. Some people are so bound by the memory of *lamented deeds* or *lost opportunities* that Satan has no trouble in defeating them though those things which happened many years ago. He will do all he can, and sometimes he has the cooperation of carnal critics, who will constantly bring up your past as you share something you might wish to pursue, or even feel God may be leading you to do. Just remember, we do have a responsibility to the past. (Ecclesiastes 3:15) Sin must be confessed and forsaken. Restitution is required if

you have defrauded someone. But we have the promise of God's Word, that "If we confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness." (I John 1:8, 9) You must allow God to help you forgive yourself and go forward in God's grace, realizing He has paid the price to free you from that condemnation. It matters not how much others and Satan try to bring it up. Your courage and determination, empowered by the Spirit, will lead you to a bright future. So, remember this about the past. *Repent of the sin, repair the damage,* (to the best of your ability) *learn from your mistakes,* and *look for God's open doors.* It is amazing how that God may sometimes bring back around those opportunities you thought had been forever forfeited. Paul says, "Forgetting those things that are behind."

Mesmerized by the Future

The second thing is we must reach for those things that are before us. Now some folks are seemingly always **Mesmerized by the Future**. I've known some that were forever going to do something great, but they seemed to never get it done. They set no goals or sacrificed time and money to do it. It was just a fancy. It was just a wish. Some chase what turns out to only be a mirage. We must reach forth to those opportunities that God gives us to improve ourselves and be a blessing to others. I have always encouraged young students to do their best in school even if they are not particularly interested in the subject at hand, because they need to be broadly fitted for whatever God calls them to do. For this to happen they must consider the third part of Paul's admonition.

Motivated in the Present

Paul said, "I press toward the mark for the prize of the high calling of God in Christ Jesus." For one to do this he must be **Motivated in the Present**. In our school we train students, after giving them placement tests to determine their competence, to set reasonable expectations. We tell them first how to set their goals and give them guidelines.

Some years ago, I was taking a flight from West Palm Beach to Cincinnati. Seated to my left was a professor from a university in Michigan. Halfway through the flight, he began to ask me questions about my faith. How do we know there is a God? What makes Christianity and Christ unique in a world of many religions? He appeared to be an honest agnostic. His questions were not hostile but sincere inquiries. He kept that conversation going for the rest of the flight.

As we approached Cincinnati, there was a storm coming through the area. Our flight was put in a holding pattern. This gave us more time to talk. I felt the presence of God as we communicated. He was open and sincere and when our flight landed, he expressed appreciation for the conversation.

One week later, I received an email from him. He told me that he had left a tragic situation in Florida, and he found it fascinating that he was sitting beside a pastor and professor of religion who was talking to him about spiritual matters. He asked for the title of the books I had recommended and told me he was attending an on-campus Bible study. He said he was amazed that Christians had such love for each other and that he was struck by the fact that in the Christian faith, it was about what Christ had done for us (grace), not what we do for Him (works).

What I didn't tell him was that on the morning of that flight, I had prayed that if there was someone on my flight that needed to hear a word from the Lord, that God would seat me beside that person and open the door. Well, He did!

What I found interesting is that the holding pattern gave us more time to explore the questions. Now, I am aware that the holding pattern was about the weather, but for the two of us, it was also about the fact that we had not finished our conversation and this holding pattern gave us more time to complete it. For us, the wait had a purpose.

I believe that God often puts His people in a holding pattern while he is working out the details of their life. Joseph waited in prison in Egypt. Abraham waited several decades after being promised a son. Paul took his first missionary journey some 14 years after his dramatic conversion.

It can seem frustrating and discouraging when we have desires and godly ambitions, and yet, things do not seem to be developing. At least not as quickly as we want. The desire might be for a certain line of work, a spouse with which to share life, a ministry to the needy, or a goal towards which we seem be making little progress.

But we must remember that the best things come to those who are patient and wait for God's timing. J. Hudson Taylor once said, "God gives the best to those who leave the choice to Him."

For years I had the desire to have my own self-employed line of work that would facilitate travel. Life was slipping by while I was employed at a good job at a Bible college. But I wanted a change and finally the right time came. The pieces fell in place and the "holding pattern" gave way to a "landing."

If you are in a holding pattern, don't lose hope. God's delays are an important part of God's direction. He has a reason for the wait. But in God's time, things will work out. As the prophet Habakkuk wrote, "The revelation awaits an APPOINTED TIME; it speaks of the end and will not prove false. Though it linger, WAIT FOR IT; IT WILL CERTAINLY COME and will not delay" (Habakkuk 2:3).

FROM PAGE 2:I think of the man who is always too busy or exhausted to attend Wednesday night prayer meeting but has no problem with his Friday night softball league. I think of the woman who only has her devotions a couple of times a month, and the man who habitually misses Sunday services because of the weather, or a headache, but has the perfect attendance award at his company.

A lesson from Enoch is in order.

Gen 5:22 And Enoch walked with God after he begat Methuselah three hundred years, and begat sons and daughters:

The phrase "walked with God" means that Enoch set himself or exercised himself to walk with God. He purposed in his heart that he would live for God.

Adam Clark writes that "the original verb carries force and signifies a reciprocal act which a man does on himself. Enoch receiving a pious education, and the Divine influence through it; in consequence of which he determines to be a worker with God, and therefore takes up the resolution to walk with his Maker, that he might not receive the grace of God in vain."

A crude illustration of this truth would be someone clipping on a leash and taking themselves for a walk. They may not feel like the effort and discipline that must be put forth, but they do it anyway. They exercise themselves because it needs to be done.

Is it time to pray, meditate upon God's Word, worship in God's house, deny myself, or use my gifts? Then, that is what I will do, so help me God. I will drag myself, if need be, to my place of responsibility.

This is what Enoch, Noah, Levi, and other Old Testament saints did to maintain victory and what we must still do today. We cannot afford to live by feelings. If we will gain the prize of eternal life, we must defy the spirit of the age and bend our will to the will of God. We do not cater to a fleshly spirit of compromise and un-commitment.

Mike Tyson, the world champion boxer, is hardly a pattern for Christian virtue but once said something that is helpful here. "Without discipline you are nothing. If you're going to be successful at anything you must approach what you hate and embrace it. You act as if that thing is your favorite thing to do."

That is a true statement for athletes as well as the children of God. You may not enjoy self-denial and discipline, but you must embrace it for your good and God's glory.

I know the prevailing spirit of the day is to resent this kind of admonition. People do not like to be rebuked and seek to justify careless and sinful behavior. Many desire to be considered spiritual people without being spiritual. Just look at the recent responses on Facebook to posts about basic Christian truth. Some of our own people refuse to own up to a poor performance, and fight hard against reasonable, biblical applications.

But preaching is what we are called to do. As preachers and teachers we must do as Paul warned Timothy in 2 Timothy 4:2 and "Preach the word; be instant in season, out of season; reprove, rebuke, exhort with all longsuffering and doctrine." God will use our words to help keep us and the sincere ones on track.

I would encourage you this winter season to consider your walk with God. Is it as consistent and enthusiastic as it ought to be? Like Sampson, are you eager in your walk with God, or are you more like Holly who must be dragged along in protest?

The good news is that like Paul, we can die daily to ourselves. The same God that saves us and delivers us from sinful addictions can entirely sanctify us and help us embrace discipline for our good and His glory. We are praying for your spiritual success in 2024. ~Editor



Richard Taylor on Discipline

"The Holy Spirit says to endure hardness like a good soldier of Jesus Christ; In these days there isn't much hardness to endure. As a consequence, our young people who have taken luxuries for granted until they have seemed like necessities, who have lived in comfortable homes, driven the best cars, enjoyed HS popularity, had money to spend and attended college where they were accustomed to lavish meals and pleasant rooms and the amenities of plush student union buildings have too often reach adulthood so conditioned to soft living that they have been totally unfit for any sphere of service which demanded ruggedness and simplicity. There is only 1 antidote to the softening tendencies of our many blessings....a rugged philosophy of discipleship grounded in a bedrock experience of holiness."

"Anything that helps us avoid softness and counteracts the innervating effects of prosperity is all to the good. And it's the simple things that make the difference. We must refuse to let a bit of weariness or disinclination keep us from prayer meeting. We must refuse to allow our faithfulness in church duties be dictated by circumstances, convenience or feelings. When life does not buffet us, we must buffet ourselves. When God prospers us, we must then of all times refuse to be easy on ourselves, rather we should be more daringly faithful than ever and make sure there is enough Spartan rigor built into our lives to maintain always the spirit and readiness of a true soldier." Have you ever asked God, "Why am I here?" What was I made for? What do I have to offer You, Lord?

And if the ear says, "I am not part of the body because I am not an eye," would that make it any [LESS] of a part of the body?" If the whole body were an eye, how would you hear? Or if your whole body were an ear, how would you smell anything?

v. 22 In fact, some of the parts of the body that seem the [WEAKEST] and [LEAST IMPORTANT] are actually the [MOST NECESSARY].

I was reminded that we shouldn't compare ourselves to the other members of the body of Christ. We each have unique gifts, struggles and experiences that serve a unique purpose for the Kingdom of God. The gifts you have are meant to touch and bless certain people. The pain and the struggles you face will someday be the testimony that ministers to someone who needs to hear about how you overcame. We weren't all created the same, and for good reason. The Bible is full of broken people that anyone would have written off, but God used in mighty ways.

Moses had a stuttering problem, Peter had a temper, Thomas was a doubter, Gideon was insecure, Paul was a murderer, Zaccheus was short, Abraham was old, Sara was impatient, Jonah ran from God.

So, if you're feeling insignificant, broken or defeated today, just a little reminder that you are extraordinary and unique and treasured by the Almighty. Yes, even your broken parts are beautiful to Him. There is purpose in the weakness. 2 Corinthians 12:9, NLT "My grace is all you need. My power works best in weakness."....."For when I am weak, then I am strong."

Coupled along with hiding God's Word in your heart, there's another part. Seek! Seeking takes effort. When you played hide and seek as a kid, you didn't usually just find someone by just standing there waiting for someone to walk to you, right? No, you had to go out and seek them. That required effort to go looking for them and then to chase after them once you found them to tag them! This New Year, if I can recommend anything to you as a young person reading this and you want to grow your relationship with God this Year, Seek Him! It will take effort, but it's so worth it. What you will find will change your life! Forever!

This year I have a challenge for anyone reading this. Let's hide and seek with God this year. Let's hide His Word in our hearts! Couldn't we at least learn one scripture passage a month together? I have included a list of twelve suggested verses below. These are basic verses that all of us should know, but if we hide them in our hearts, I believe God would be honored! Then, let's seek Him! Seek Him, by spending daily time in prayer. Talking to Him about everything that is going on in our lives, sharing our concerns, bringing our burdens to Him. Then reading His word and let Him speak to us through that. This year I challenge you to Hide and Seek!

Suggested verses:

Parents do the same things, hopefully, in the home. We don't ask our four-year-old son to cook breakfast, but we do show him how to pick up his toys and straighten up his room. As he grows, age-appropriate tasks are added to ensure that he will become a responsible adult. Along the way, we test students to evaluate, and ensure that they are making proper progress. But through loving instruction and proper discipline we take them to the mark of a responsible citizen. In this same way, God wants us to have our eyes trained on what He wants to do in, and for us, and also with us, in Kingdom work.

Let me challenge you today not to be paralyzed by your past. Paul says, "forgetting those things which are behind." Remember them only to be instructed. Don't be chained by disappointments, failures, or broken dreams. Don't continuously look to a distant mirage of hope.
