We had left a nice church where we felt the Lord had helped us over a nearly six year period. The Lord had met with us many times in prayer and petitioning God for the course we should take. He had shown me the land where we would be living. The gentleman who owned the land drove me to the place, and I excitedly exclaimed, "This is it!" We bought a used mobile home to move onto the little farm. The view of the valley, the cheerful playing of our children, the splashing in the creek, and the coziness of family times at the end of the day all made for wonderful memories.

I was the newly elected Conference President, and my income amounted to about \$32.50 per week. To make ends meet, we conducted revivals, preaching and singing through many open doors. Winter came. Money became a scarce item. We worked hard, and it was a blessing to have a wonderful companion to face the battles together.

The contractor from whom we bought the farm gave me a job on a hotel renovation. However, it was understood that I would be free to go if there was a Church or Conference situation that needed my time and attention. It was a cold February and the job had run its course. Our need became more pressing until it became clear that something must be done. I called a family meeting at our family prayer time one evening. Our children, Allen, Renee, and Deborah, sat very attentively and listened to me explain our need. I told them that I was sharing the need, not to cause them to be fearful, but rather to see the Lord meet our need. We desperately needed about \$256.00 in the next three days. I had prayed at my old prayer log over in the woods. The Lord promised He would answer prayer. We gathered close and began to call on God. Suddenly our mobile home was alive with the power and presence of the Holy Spirit. A refreshing confidence flooded our souls that God was saying, "Stand still and see the salvation of the Lord!" We wept and rejoiced as a family.

There was nothing in the mail box the next day. When Allen and Renee got off the school bus that afternoon, Allen said, "Daddy, did the money come?" I replied that the Lord would answer in His time. The third day I went back to the woods and reminded the Lord that my children had invested in this petition and we expected help.

The next day I stared at an empty mail box. I drove back down that long lane and wondered how and when. Patsy and I were in the kitchen when we heard the rocks pinging off the bottom of the car as it came speeding down our rough drive. The contractor friend hobbled out of the car on crutches. (He had broken his ankle during a fall down the old hotel elevator shaft.) I opened the door and welcomed him in and sat a hot cup of coffee in front of him. He reached into his shirt pocket and handed me a check, saying, "I don't know what this is all about, but here it is." I protested for a second and he said that he had been halfway to a town 30 miles away to pick up his wife. He said, "On the way down, the Lord spoke to me about this money from the corn crop. God said, 'I want you to take it to those kids.' I told the Lord that I would deliver it to them when I got back. But the Lord said, 'I mean NOW!' It hit me so hard that I slammed on my brakes and turned into the next driveway. Here it is!!"

When he left, I opened the check and placed it on the table. Patsy and I both wept and praised the Lord! When the kids got off the bus, without a word they looked into our eyes with an inquisitive look. I smiled and said, "Wait until we get to the house." We gathered around the table and reviewed our request from the Lord. I showed them the check. It amounted to \$300.00. The next day, I told them, "We'll pay our tithes, and our bills. The Lord said that he would withhold no good thing from those that are His. Come on, let's stop at the Dairy Queen!" Praise the Lord. HE arrived just in time! **James A. Southerland, Sr.**

I Will Build My Church

I would like to say how much I appreciate Dan Plemmons being willing to continue to connect our churches and pastors through the means of printed media. He spends many hours just maintaining our website, and now he has taken on an additional responsibility with the publishing of our new "*Pilgrim News & Notes*!" Thank You, Bro. Dan Plemmons!

When we were asked to submit an article for the column of 'Pastor to Pastor', we thought we might share something in the way of a personal illustration that has been of help to us in our ministry here. I'm sure many young pastors have had the experience of going to a new church where perhaps the attendance was small, but thrilled to be in the service of the King. Soon after accepting the charge, however, they have heard the news that from their small congregation, a family was leaving. What a discouragement to a young minister.

When Nancy and I first came to pastor the church here in Palestine, a little over 32 years ago, the church was very small in number. We had been in full-time evangelism for the previous 13 years and had thoroughly enjoyed working in that capacity. But we felt the Lord leading us to Palestine and Bro. Southerland had asked if we would be willing to shepherd the flock for six months. If nothing advanced, it looked like the conference would be forced to close the doors. There weren't any children attending and only 9 or 10 senior adults. However, we were thrilled when a new family started coming who had two teenage children and all four of them had become Christians! What a bright spot and encouragement to our hearts!

However, while we were in a revival meeting out of state, the missionary president, who was not a member of our church, had taken it upon herself to address a certain situation during the missionary service on Wednesday night. This incident greatly offended our new convert family. When we came home we found that they had made the decision to never come back! What a shock and what a discouragement!

I am not one who is given to seeing visions, but the Lord knew I needed something to help me at that very discouraging time! One morning while kneeling at my chair in prayer, it seemed as if God showed me a vision of a brick wall that was being built before me. Both sides were already completed, but there was a gap or opening in the middle. It seemed that the hands of the One laying the bricks were not mine, but they were God's. As I knelt there, I watched as on either side of the Bricklayer was a pile of bricks. He would pick up a brick from the pile on the left, set it in the opening, then shake his head, and put that

brick on the pile on His right side. One after another, I would see Him pick up a brick ~ put it in the opening ~ move it from side to side and shake His head and again, place it in the pile on the other side. Then I watched Him pick up a brick, set it in the opening and nod His head, take the mortar and mortar in that brick and it became a part of the wall. In watching this for some time, I saw Him build and fill in the opening and it seemed that I heard the voice of the Lord as He said, "Son, I will build my church! Just be sure it is My church and not yours! I know what is needed to build My church! Just trust me!"

Suddenly, my heart was flooded with peace as I came to the realization that if I would make certain it was His church then He would build it according to His will! Consequently, through these many years, at various times it would look like a new family might be starting to attend or word would reach us through the grapevine that some might be thinking about leaving, but as long as I knew the church was still His, then I could relax knowing that God is building His church!

So fellow pastor, we have the awesome privilege of working with the Master Builder! May we joyfully follow and accept His blueprint, pattern, and plan, making certain the church we pastor belongs to Him! Jesus said, *"I will build my church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it."* Matt.16:18

Proverbs 31: The Value of Virtue

"What is it worth?" That is the question I frequently ask my husband while on our Saturday morning garage sale excursions. We're new to the game. In fact, it was just this spring that we decided to get out of bed a bit earlier on our days off and join the great American tradition of shopping in the garages of people who are des-


perate to unload the clutter and make a little summertime cash. One thing we have learned over the last few months is that not all items are priced in the range of their worth. Take, for instance, the brand new Nike tennis shoes I picked up for \$1. Apparently the seller didn't realize that the same shoes (only this year's model instead of last) were pictured in the Kohl's ad for \$80. Of course, the fact that they fit me perfectly meant that I had myself a deal! Although the Nike shoe seller could have priced them several times higher than she did and still had my business, I only had to pay the value she assigned to them. And I was ecstatic.

In a recent conversation with an aunt, she described a shopping trip to an antique store. She and another of my aunts were shopping together, and one of them was interested in a set of fine china dishes that were displayed. After a few minutes spent negotiating the price, the store owner named a ridiculously low amount. She cited the reason: "This generation doesn't buy china." What was once a treasured, esteemed part of the culture of a home no longer has a place because we are a hurried bunch of people who like to use only what can be tossed into a dishwasher or the garbage can. Our emphasis has shifted to accommodate our lifestyle.

If we are not careful, a slower pace and dinner on fine china aren't the only things that will slip away from us. It would be very easy in this day to do as much of the culture is doing, and devalue those things that God has specifically said are most worthy. In Proverbs 31:10, we find these words, "Who can find a virtuous woman? For her price is far above rubies." Notice that the writer didn't define this woman as pretty, thin, or rich. She is virtuous – strong, morally excellent, honorable, righteous, good, upright, honest, loyal, hardworking, and trustworthy. When was the last time we saw any of those words on the cover of a popular women's magazine? We haven't, and we won't. The world places emphasis on the superficial. God wants His girls to be genuine. The world is attracted to the seductive. God challenges us to moral purity. The world warns us to watch out for ourselves. God gives us the beautiful responsibility of seeing to the needs of others.

Few things can be more frustrating than putting together a cart of carefully selected items, only to later find that several of your purchases were more expensive than you realized. Although the reasons are varied, the resulting confusion is the same. Just as real is the confusion that results when we measure our value by the world's standards. If you've labeled yourself with one of the world's price tags, dig into the Word to discover the difference. Diamonds are usually advertised as being the jewel of choice, but I recently read that an exceptional Ruby of three carats or more will bring a higher price than an equivalent Diamond. As a woman of virtue, your worth is spectacular! God wants you to accept and embrace the great value that He places on you. Walk confidently today, knowing that you are a daughter of the King!

Highlighting the Laity

In this feature, we desire to bring special attention to individuals that, even though you might never see them on the platform of Pilgrim Camp, or their names on a marquee, they are equally valuable to the ongoing work of the local church.

If you've been to Pilgrim Family Camp in the last few years, you may have noticed that distinguished looking head usher and his lovely wife.

Meet Marvin (wife, Julie) Reynolds!

Marvin was born on April 20, 1951, in Columbus, Indiana. His parents, Rev. Kenneth and Wanda Reynolds, pastored the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Hope, Indiana.

In February of 1968 (at the young age of 16), Marvin started a Western Wear & Saddlery business called, MD Reynolds Saddlery and Western Wear, thus garnering him the moniker, MD. Even today, it is not all that unusual for someone to holler out, "Hey MD!" During his many years in this business, MD made many trips to Nevada, Mexico, and Texas picking up supplies for the business. He also raised registered Quarter Horses. He broke and trained many horses, and he also trained riders. He spent many a night building custom saddles.

During this time, he also started another successful business, so he decided to sell the western store and most of his horses in 1979.

In 1973, Marvin started Lincoln Hills Taxidermy, which grew into a very large business. Animals from many countries were sent to his shop to be mounted for some outstanding hunters. Perhaps the most rare animal he mounted, was a full-size, 10-foot Polar Bear! Everything from "Mouse to Moose" were "stuffed" for his clients during his 33 years in that business. Marvin sold the business in 2007.

Marvin began hunting in 1973, and was soon traveling to Tennessee chasing Wild, Russian Boar! One of the biggest thrills for him is hunting wild boar with hounds. According to his records, he has harvested over 700 of them, even killing one with a spear!

His hunts have taken him to many western states, Canada (5 Provinces), Alaska, and even 3 African Safari hunts. (Taking over 150 North American animals, and 52 African animals . . . most of these are mounted in his trophy room, including the "African Big 5" - Elephant, Lion, Cape Buffalo, Leopard, Rhinoceros, and a 9' 2" Kodiak Grizzly Bear)

For most of his life, Marvin has walked with the Lord with a conscientious desire to please Him. Unfortunately, there were a few years when he departed from the Lord, but God was merciful and patiently waited for him to return to the fold.

Marvin has always loved the atmosphere of Camp Meeting! The Fern Creek Wesleyan Methodist Camp in Louisville, Kentucky, was always a highlight of his life in those early years! In 1967, he became involved in music and was the Asst. Song Director at the Corydon Church of the Nazarene. During the year of 1969-1970, he also sang tenor for the New Revelations Quartet, traveling 1-2 Sundays per month.

In 1971, he became the Minister of Music at the Corydon Church of the Nazarene and served in that capacity until 1988. In 1991, he became the Song Leader at the Shiloh Pilgrim Holiness Church in Corydon, Indiana,

where he & his wife, Julie, still attend. (Incidentally, the Shiloh Pilgrim Holiness Church was built by Marvin's grandparents and uncle back in the 1940s.)

For a number of years, Marvin served the Shiloh Pilgrim Holiness Church under Rev. Melvin Beecher and for the past 12 years under Rev. Mark Ranke. He fills the positions of Song Director, Board Member, Asst. Adult SS Teacher and Trustee. He also does some substitute teaching at the Shiloh Pilgrim Holiness School. (Among his many lists of accomplishments in life, he is also a retired public school teacher.)

Here is "Marvin's Testimony" in his own words ...

Jesus Christ is my Savior, Redeemer, Sanctifier, and Healer! Without HIM, my life would be pointless and incomplete! Outside of a few years, when I strayed away from Him, He has kept my life happy and full of joy!

God's guidance, provisions, blessings (and chastisements) have helped me to keep my ethics, morals, and values above reproach. In my businesses and life experiences, there have been many opportunities for greed, vice, and corruption, but God has been there to lead me in the right way! Without Him, my entire life would be in shambles!

In the last 6 years, Julie & I have been tried, tested, and have experienced some tremendous storms, both physically as well as emotionally! Always at the lowest moments of these valleys, God's grace has prevailed!

The Midwest Pilgrims are our people! I am not a minister, evangelist, or a singer, yet Julie & I have been loved, prayed for, and taken in as if we had always been a member of this great conference. God has blessed us beyond measure!

I believe that if we (the Pilgrims) stay with the WORD as our guide, pray fervently, and stoke the fires of commitment, the Holy Spirit will help us to win new souls to Him and cause our churches to grow!

May we work until Jesus comes back for His Bride!

An Interview with Pastor Richard Smith

Richard and Debbie Smith have pastored the Pilgrim Holiness Church in Harrisburg, Ohio, since 1979, and we wanted our readers to get a closer look at this outstanding couple!

DP - Please give us a little background of where you where raised and how you came to know Christ.

RS - I had a very happy childhood. My mother and father were excellent parents. My father was a factory worker at Westinghouse and he also worked a second job as a security guard. Mom was a stay-at-home mom. I have one older sister. I grew up in Grove City, Ohio, and enjoyed life as most boys do.

My parents were not Christians for most of my young life. This did not change until I was about eleven. My sister came home from school and asked my parents if she could go to revival. She went and came home with the announcement that she had been saved. Mom and dad did not know what to think about it.

My mom's family was Old Regular Baptist and dad's mom was Jehovah Witness. My sister was saved in an Apostolic church. They were concerned about the tongues business. Dad worked with two preachers, one was Enterprise Baptist and the other was Holiness. They both were helping Dad to see the error in the tongues movement. Dad promised my sister that we would start going to church as a family. He also told her that we would go to the church that he felt was right. We went to the Enterprise Baptist Church some and to the Holiness Church some. Dad was saved in the Holiness Church. Mom was saved in the Enterprise Baptist Church. It wasn't long until our family started attending a Christian Baptist Church in Grove City, Ohio. This was all new to me and I just went along for the ride.

I was first saved at the age of 13 at the Christian Baptist youth camp in Wheelersburg, Ohio. I was getting deeper and deeper in sin. I was a thief, a liar, and had a filthy mouth. After I was saved my life changed. About three months later as I lay in bed asleep, I was awakened and a voice said, "Will you preach for me?" I will never forget my reaction. I turned my face to the wall and said nothing. I had no intentions of preaching.

From there my life went downhill. I finally admitted I had backslidden. When a friend asked me during a revival altar call if I had ever been saved, I said, "No." The door closed and I went deeper into sin.

A year later and farther from God than ever before, I went to camp determined not to get saved. The camp meeting was almost over when one night God came on the service and old time conviction hit my soul. I hit the altar. God reclaimed my soul! I laughed and cried for an hour. I was free! This time I meant business with God. I walked in the light. He was faithful to my soul. I went on in the Christian Baptist Church where I soon married the pastor's daughter. About a year later we left the Christian Baptist Church and started attending a Wesleyan Holiness Church. Soon after, God placed the burden to preach again on my heart.

DP - How did you meet your wife, Debbie, and please tell us about the rest of your family.

RS - We first met at church youth camp in 1970. We became best friends. We did not start dating until 1973 and were married in 1975. Debbie and I have 4 children. 1 boy and three girls. All married.

DP - How long have you served as Pastor of the Harrisburg PHC?

RS - I have been the Pastor for 35 years.

DP - Who have been your biggest positive influences in ministry?

RS - Rev. F. C. Porter, Rev. Bill Rogers, Rev. Eugene Gray, Rev. James Southerland, and my dad.

DP - What is the biggest lesson you have learned since entering the ministry?

RS - To keep my eyes on Jesus and to maintain a strong relationship with Him. As someone said, "It's not about religion, it's about a relationship."

DP - What has been the biggest surprise about pastoral life?

RS - How quickly people change.

DP - What do you wish most church members understood about pastors?

RS - How great the burden is, and that it must be shared.

DP - Share with us a time in your ministry when God really worked a miracle!

RS - There are many. When we were trying to find financing to purchase the church, church loans at that time were very hard to find. After we signed the contract, the pressure was on to find financing. I went through the Columbus, Ohio, phone book and called every bank and was turned down time after time. Needless to say, I became very discouraged with the process.

When I called the last bank on the list, with the phone book still on my lap, I prayed, "Lord, if your want us to have this church in Harrisburg, we need Your help!" When I finished praying, I was staring at the phone book and a phone number seemed to jump out of the page. The Lord said to call that number. I said, "Lord, I have already been turned down by this bank at a branch office." I was still impressed to call the number. I will never forget that phone conversation. A lady answered the phone and asked how she could help me. I told her that we needed a commercial loan. She then told me that they were doing some of those types of loans, but very few. Then she asked for what the loan was going to be used. I said, "A church!" She said that she could not help us, but would give me a number of someone that possibly could. She gave me the number and I called. A man answered and I went through the story of what we needed. Then he said, "Oh, a church!", and was very interested in our project. He even wanted to come down and see the church. After all was said and done, we received the needed loan for the church!

I asked the bank manager to whom we were assigned about who this man was, and he said, "Pastor Smith, I am not sure how you got this man's phone number, but he is the VP of the Ohio State Bank and is on the review board that will approve this loan!" God does answer prayer!

DP - Your overall thoughts on life as a pastor?

RS - Pastoring is one of the hardest jobs that I have ever done. The responsibility and burden, if your heart is in it, is sometimes unbearable. But on the other side, it is the most rewarding job that I have ever done!!

Below are a few suggestions of ways you can give "honour to whom honour" is due. (Rom 13:7)

• Card and Letter Shower - distribute stamped cards and envelopes addressed to the pastor. Personalize the comments and mail during the month.

• Personal Gifts - present a gift item of special significance with the pastor's name engraved on it. (Ex. a coffee mug, or pen set)

- Large Card this can be signed by the different departments, such as the Children's Church, youth group, etc.
- **Church Photo** have the congregation's picture taken in front of the church. Have it framed and present it to him.
- **Books** most pastors love books. Gift wrap a set of commentaries, present books of special interests or simply give a gift card to the local bookstore.
- **Media Presentation** Prepare a power point presentation of the pastor and church activities throughout the year. Show it in place of a service this month.
- **Community Acknowledgment** take out a full-page ad in the local newspaper. Feature your pastor with a public declaration of your church's love for your leader.
- Office/Home Makeover redecorate the pastor's study with fresh paint, updated decor, new furniture, or a personal computer upgrade.
- **Fill The Calendar** use an October calendar and schedule a month-long variety of special treats for the pastor and family. Have the congregation sign up for days to remember the pastor. Ideas could include a balloon delivery, bring a favorite dessert, gift cards, a car wash, a day away at your expense, take them out for a meal, etc.
- **Guest Speaker** give the pastor a break by scheduling special speakers throughout the month.
- **Get Away** pay for a 3-day, all expenses paid, get away for the pastoral family. Make reservations for a place they would enjoy.
- Weeks Salary statistically, most pastors make less than most in their congregations. An extra paycheck will go a long way in showing how much you care.
- **Money Tree** provide a bare branch and have the congregation paperclip money to it, then present it to the pastor with a card from the church.
- **Prayer Commitment** he prays for you, now you promise to pray for him. Schedule times to have special prayer for the pastor, his family, health, finances, stability, courage in ministry, marriage, freedom to dream, success in ministry, permission to lead, etc.
- "Rainy Day Jar" have the congregants fill a decorated jar with notes of inspiration and encouragement which the pastor can then read whenever a boost is needed.
- **Professional Development** underwrite the expenses to a pastor's retreat, conference or pay for some continuing education classes.

These are a few suggestions to get your creative juices flowing. Honor God by honoring His servants. After a month of special surprises, shouldn't your pastor feel appreciated? Make it happen!




